His academic work, published in both Sinhala and English, has appeared in international journals. Beyond writing and research, he has curated numerous cultural events and festivals, notably Red: Festival of Love. He also serves as a visiting academic at the Faculty of Graduate Studies, University of Colombo.


# SAARC Film Day 2025 held at Ananda College, Colombo

The SAARC Cultural Centre launched the inaugural edition of the SAARC Film Days 2025 on 29<sup>th</sup> May at the Kularathna Auditorium of Ananda College, Colombo. The featured screening was "Ankhi O Tar Bondhura" (Akhi and Her Friends), a critically acclaimed children's film from Bangladesh, directed by celebrated filmmaker Morshedul Islam.

The event drew an enthusiastic audience of over 900 schoolchildren, filling the auditorium and highlighting the growing interest in regional cultural initiatives among the youth. The programme aimed to promote cultural awareness, foster regional friendship, and encourage appreciation of South Asian cinema.







Several dignitaries graced the event. His Excellency Mr. Andalib Elias, High Commissioner of Bangladesh to Sri Lanka, attended as the Chief Guest, while His Excellency Mr. Purna Bahadur Nepali, Ambassador of Nepal to Sri Lanka, and Mr. D.M. Lal Dissanayake, Principal of Ananda College, were present as Guests of Honour. Other attendees included Dr. B. 

To celebrate International Women's Day 2025, SAARC Cultural Centre (SCC) hosted an online forum on Tuesday, 11th March 2025, under the theme "Remembering 20th Century South Asian Women in Culture." The event brought together distinguished speakers from India, Pakistan, Nepal, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka to honour the legacy of iconic women who made remarkable contributions to South Asia's cultural and intellectual history.

- Dr. Kumud Bhansali spoke on Irawati Karvé (India), Pioneering anthropologist and sociologist, whose work reshaped Indian cultural and caste studies.
- Dr. Nabiha Fatima spoke on Noor Jahan (Pakistan), Legendary singer and cultural icon, who broke barriers in music and film.
- Prof. Sangita Rayamajhi spoke on Bishnu Kumari Waiba 'Parijat' (Nepal), Literary voice of resistance,

known for powerful narratives addressing gender and social issues.

- Jinat Ara Haque spoke on Begum Sufia Kamal (Bangladesh), Poet and activist who championed women's rights and played a key role in Bangladesh's liberation movement.
- Irushi Tennekoon spoke on Minette De Silva (Sri Lanka), Internationally acclaimed modernist architect and South Asia's architectural pioneer.

With nearly 60 participants joining virtually from across the SAARC region, the forum fostered rich dialogue on women's cultural legacies, challenges, and inspirations. O&A session followed the presentations, marked by enthusiastic participation and insightful reflections.



The second session of the online forum "Remembering 20th Century South Asian Women in Culture" was held on Wednesday, 21st May 2025, via Zoom, drawing more than 40 participants from across the SAARC region. Organized under the South Asian Cultural Cooperation (SCC) initiative, the session brought together scholars, researchers, and cultural practitioners to reflect on the lives and legacies of five iconic women who helped shape South Asia's cultural heritage.

- Prof. Swati Ganguly spoke on Dr. Kapila Vatsyayan (India), a pioneering scholar of Indian classical arts and founding director of the Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts.
- Moneeza Hashmi spoke on Bano Qudsia (Pakistan), a revered novelist and playwright known for her deep philosophical insights and powerful Urdu literature.
- Dr. Sonam Choden spoke on Gyalyum Phuntsho Choden Wangchuck (Bhutan), a royal figure celebrated for her role in preserving and promoting Bhutan's traditional arts and crafts.


- Mariyam Isha Azeez spoke on Al-Nabeela Aminath Hussein (Maldives), an influential educator and poetess who played a key role in advancing girls' education and women's civic engagement.
- Dr. Darshi Thoradeniya spoke on Sivagami Verina Obeyesekere (Sri Lanka), a cultural entrepreneur who empowered rural women and revived traditional handicrafts.

The presentations highlighted how these women defied societal constraints and became agents of change in fields ranging from arts and literature to education and cultural policy. Their lives illustrated broader themes of gender, modernity, and identity across post-colonial South Asia.

The session concluded with a lively Q&A, during which participants expressed gratitude for the rich insights and compelling narratives. The forum served as a powerful reminder of the need to remember and celebrate the women who helped shape South Asia's intellectual and cultural foundations and of the continued effort needed to bring their stories to light.

# SAARC TALK SERIES 2025





SAARC Cultural Centre (SCC) successfully launched the first session of the SAARC Talk Series 2025 on Thursday 27th March 2025, in virtual mode. The keynote lecture, titled "Heritage Diplomacy: Negotiating the Mechanisms of Geographical Indication Rights to Safeguard the Shared Living Cultural Heritage of South Asia", was delivered by Prof. Md. Masood Imran, Department of Archaeology, Jahangirnagar University, Bangladesh.

Prof. Imran explored the pressing need for

effective heritage diplomacy in the Global South, emphasizing the role of Geographical Indication (GI) rights in preserving cultural identity, asserting regional agency, and promoting economic cooperation. Through case studies such as the Basmati rice dispute and Champagne protection, he illustrated how GI diplomacy shapes global trade and safeguards intangible heritage.

The session drew 96 participants from across the SAARC region and concluded with an interactive Q&A, receiving enthusiastic feedback.

## **SAARC Talk Series 2025**




SAARC Cultural Centre hosted the second session of the SAARC Talk Series 2025 on 25<sup>th</sup> April 2025, featuring renowned educationist Prof. Thakur S. Powdyel, former Minister of Education, Royal Government of Bhutan. The session, held virtually, drew participants across the SAARC region.

Speaking on the theme "Re-claiming the Soul of Universities," Prof. Powdyel emphasized the importance of reviving the original vision and values that define higher education. He distinguished

between the "outer life" of universities comprising infrastructure and systems and their "inner life," which embodies purpose, inspiration, and intellectual integrity.

He urged universities to move beyond market-driven models and reaffirm their role as transformative institutions that nurture wisdom, uphold values, and build enlightened societies. The session concluded with an engaging Q&A and received highly positive feedback.



The third session of the SAARC Talk Series 2025 was held virtually on Friday, 13<sup>th</sup> June 2025, featuring renowned educationist, historian, and archaeologist Prof. Sudeshna Guha from Shiv Nadar Institute of Eminence, India.

Prof. Guha offered a thought-provoking exploration of how heritage is constructed and curated within museums, drawing upon South Asian contexts and global museum practices. She emphasized the importance of object biographies, digital databases, and the role of institutions in shaping historical narratives. Case studies from India, including the National Museum in New Delhi and the heritage town of Vadnagar, illustrated how heritage intersects with politics, identity, and nation-building.

The session drew 40 participants from across the SAARC region and concluded with an interactive Q&A, receiving enthusiastic feedback.

## Bangladesh National Day Celebration

### SAARC Cultural Centre Celebrates Pohela Falgun with Colour and Culture




